TOURISTIC VISITS AND MONUMENTS


n the fourth day we visited Copenhagen with the Danish students.

he National Museum of Danemark is the largest museum of cultural history in Denmark, presenting Danish history and culture from Prehistoric times to the present day.

The museum has artifacts from the Stone Age, the Viking Age, the Middle Ages, and more recent periods. It also owns collections of cultural artifacts from around the world and former Danish colonies.

Some of the notable exhibits at the Danish National Museum include the Gundestrup cauldron, one of the most important relics of the European Iron Age; the Sun Chariot, a Bronze Age artifact; and the Egtved Girl, a well-preserved Bronze Age burial find.







The museum offers a wide range of educational programs and events for visitors of all ages, and its exhibitions provide insights into Danish history, culture, and heritage.

Upon our arrival at the museum - that was our last day- the teacher first gave us a quiz paper and assigned groups to complete a treasure hunt in the National Danish Museum.

We had various questions where we needed to find specific artifacts and information to complete the quiz.
